FINDING HOPE IN AN ERA OF DESPAIR AND NEGATIVITY

Do you still believe in hope, especially with the turbulent social climate we are experiencing? Do you think there is still positivity when we are saturated with negativity? Do you know someone who can genuinely uplift you or the community when all that we see takes our morale down?

These are some of the questions that I ponder at a time when views are polarized. Opposing views with dysfunctional delivery of rhetoric undermine a healthy discourse of civility and respect. Many are contented with this new reality. I am not.

This new reality can make us give up on the concept of hope. One may conclude that hope is impossible. However, it is not.

We are the children of Easter. We are God's creation from His image and likeness who firmly believe in hope brought about by Christ's resurrection from the dead. We firmly believe that Christ destroyed sin rooted in evil, and repaired man's relationship with God through His crucifixion and resurrection. Therefore, the evil that tries to destroy us cannot dominate us. Good triumphs in the end. It is God's ultimate will that we should ultimately trust.

That we should give up hope in otherwise hopeless situations is not God's will. Moreover, by giving up hope we are renouncing the promise of Easter and Christ. We must fall back on our Faith and what it means for us. It means we must step back, pause, read, and meditate on His word. and listen to Him through the loudness of silence. It will make us stronger in times of despair. We will stir with clear direction. We are moved by a positive call for action. In these moments, we join Christ in the resurrection experience.

In these times, we must go against the wave. But how? We cannot rebuke fire when they breathe fire onto us. As children of Easter, we must treat them with love and compassion, just as Christ has thought us.

Supreme Chaplain's Message

THE CHURCH MUST ADDRESS THE ABUSE CRISIS WITH A TRUE LENTEN SPIRIT OF RENEWAL AND HOPE

Back in 2010, a newspaper article described the sexual abuse crisis in the Church as "a long Lent." At the time, I regarded such a description as unfair to the season of Lent. The article chastised the Church's leaders for their failures but also depicted the Church itself as caught in a sorry and hopeless quagmire. But Lent isn't about misery and hopelessness. Quite the opposite. The liturgy describes Lent as God's "gracious gift," a time when his people prepare to celebrate the Paschal Mystery "with the joy of minds made pure." The point of Lent's chastisements is our inward purification by the Holy Spirit — always the key to authentic renewal and joy.

However, the season of Lent, understood correctly, does indeed shed light on the crisis that has plagued victim-survivors of abuse and the Church itself for far too long. If we speak of this crisis as "a long Lent," we should really mean: Now is the time to address this crisis at its roots by the purification and renewal of the Church. With this in mind, let me suggest three connections between the season of Lent and the sexual abuse crisis.

First, in Lent each of us must acknowledge our sins by which we reject God's love and inflict pain on others. As we pray in Psalm 51: "Against you, you alone, have I sinned; I have done what is evil in your eyes." During Lent, we should make a complete and unburdening confession of our sins in the sacrament of reconciliation. Similarly, this is a time when the Church's leaders must fully acknowledge past sins and failures that have inflicted great spiritual, physical and psychological harm on many innocent people. Such an acknowledgment must be coupled with heartfelt resolve to continue helping victim-survivors who struggle with the ongoing impact of past abuse.

Second, the Lenten confession of our sins is more than wiping the slate clean. It must be accompanied by earnest prayer for interior purification. Again, to quote Psalm 51: "A clean heart create for me, God; renew within me a steadfast spirit." Through prayer, penance and almsgiving, we seek to stand transparent before the God who looks deeply into our hearts. We pray that our external words and actions may flow from a heart and soul cleansed of our sins and impure motives by

the refining fire of God's love. Something similar needs to happen continually in the Church's life. It is not enough for Church leaders to admit past sins and errors; nor is it enough to strengthen measures to prevent abuse and to attain greater accountability — vitally important as these are. Truthfully, all such efforts aimed at transparency will miss the mark unless they proceed from prayerful and discerning hearts and minds that have been thoroughly purified and renewed by the Holy Spirit.

Third, during Lent we acknowledge our sins and repent of them so that we might embrace our faith more boldly and live it with greater courage and love. Lent is also a time of growth in the Church's life — interior growth and the joy of welcoming new members at Easter. So too, even in this most challenging time in the Church's life, we must not lose heart. We must continue to proclaim and live the Gospel with confidence and love. We must continue to be people of charity and compassion. We must be people open to the Holy Spirit, by whom we are joined to Christ and to one another in the Church.

May this long Lent lead to an Easter of renewed hope and joy — for ourselves, for the Church and for those who have been harmed.

WARRIORS TO LOURDES

Since 2013, the Knights of Columbus has worked with the Archdiocese for the Military Services, USA, to sponsor the Warriors to Lourdes Pilgrimage. The event allows non-wounded, wounded, ill or injured military personnel; their designated caregivers; and volunteers to travel to the Marian shrine in May during the International Military Pilgrimage (PMI) for a time of rest, prayer and healing.

The PMI was established in 1946 to promote reconciliation and peace after World War II. Every year since, for one weekend in May, Lourdes has become a place of prayer and healing for active-duty members and veterans representing more than 40 nations.

Lourdes is one of the most popular Catholic pilgrimage destinations in the world. It was the location of a series of 19th-century apparitions, during which the Blessed Virgin Mary appeared to 14-year-old Bernadette Soubirous. During the past 100 years, millions of pilgrims have flocked to the site, with the hope of receiving a special healing and a deepening of faith.

Field Agent's Message

April 15th, Tax Day, is not far off. It's a time when most of us focus on the income we've made....and how much of that we have to hand over to the government. Nobody's happy about that. The Saint John Paul II National Shrine is a place of worship, religious formation, and cultural renewal to feed the minds and souls of its visitors. It is a place of pilgrimage with a first-class relic of St. John Paul II's blood available for veneration.

Through liturgy and prayer, art, cultural events, and religious celebrations, pilgrims can enter into our patron's deep love for God and for man. A major permanent exhibit highlights significant events in the life of Pope John Paul II and his momentous influence as the spiritual father of one billion Catholics and as a world leader.

From its conception, the Shrine was intended as a response to St. John Paul II's call for a "new evangelization," which was repeated by Pope Benedict XVI and Pope Francis. It is meant to be a place of genuine encounter with God that leads to a renewal of individuals, families, societies, and cultures — a place where God, who "entered history" (John Paul II, Homily, Dec. 24, 1999), heals and renews every dimension of human life.

The United States Conference of Catholic Bishops designated the Shrine a national shrine on March 14, 2014.
