### Chaplain's Message

The major part of the month of December is the season of Advent. The Advent season is a time of preparation that directs our hearts and minds to Christ's second coming at the end of time and also to the anniversary of the Lord's birth on Christmas. The final days of Advent, from December 17 to December 24, focus particularly on our preparation for the celebrations of the Nativity of our Lord.

The liturgical color for Advent is purple, just like Lent—as both are seasons that prepare us for great feast days. Also, Advent (like Lent) includes an element of penance in the sense of preparing, quieting and disciplining our hearts for the full joy of Christmas. This penitential dimension is expressed through the color purple, but also through the restrained manner of decorating the church and altar: "During Advent the floral decoration of the altar should be marked by a moderation suited to the character of this time of year, without expressing in anticipation the full joy of the Nativity of the Lord."

One of the advent devotions is Advent wreath. Traditionally, Advent wreaths are constructed of a circle of evergreen branches into which four candles are inserted, representing the four weeks of Advent. Ideally, three candles are purple, and one is rose, but white candles can also be used.

The purple candles in particular symbolize the prayer, penance, and preparatory sacrifices and goods works undertaken at this time. The rose candle is lit on the third Sunday, Gaudete Sunday, when the priest also wears rose vestments at Mass; Gaudete Sunday is the Sunday of rejoicing, because the faithful have arrived at the midpoint of Advent, when their preparation is now half over and they are close to Christmas.

The progressive lighting of the candles symbolizes the expectation and hope surrounding our Lord's first coming into the world and the anticipation of his second coming to judge the living and the dead.

Advent wreath Blessing:

Lord our God, we praise you for your Son, Jesus Christ: he is Emmanuel, the hope of the peoples, he is the wisdom that teaches and guides us, he is the Savior of every nation.

## Field Agent's Message

#### **DISABILITY INCOME PROTECTION – ITS TIME IS NOW**

Despite the statistical data that clearly illustrates the impact of disabilities, many consumers are simply unaware of the risks associated with long-term illness and injury and find themselves unprepared when disability strikes. According to the actuaries, someone entering the workforce today has an approximately 30% chance of suffering a long-term disability of 90 days or longer at some point in their career and that disability will last on average three years. Despite this very real risk, survey after survey of workers reveals a perceived risk of disability closer to 2% rather than the 30% the actuaries tell us about. That suggests a significant disconnect between perception and reality!

Perhaps one of the reasons so many underestimate the risk of disability is that they associate disabilities with accidents. Therefore, anyone who doesn't lead a daredevil lifestyle or have a dangerous job must not face a real risk. If someone works in an office and sits at a desk, they must be immune to disability risk, right? Wrong. What they are missing is the critical knowledge that only about 10% of long-term disabilities are caused by accidents and the other 90% results from the litany of illnesses that can disable someone – illnesses such as cancer, heart disease, diabetes, arthritis, and depression.

In 1992 Cardinal John
O'Connor of New York
challenged Knights of
Columbus units
throughout the Order to
pay tribute to the millions
of children killed by
abortion by erecting
memorials in Catholic
cemeteries, on council hall
grounds, and at Parishes.

Since the program began, thousands of these memorials have been built. These monuments, ranging from simple headstones to elaborate memorials, stand as testimony to one simple fact: Human life is a sacred gift from God to be protected and cherished at all stages, from conception to natural death.


## **Council Approves Memorial to Unborn Children**

At its October 15 business meeting, the council voted to approve the motion presented by PGK Carlos Garcia at the October business meeting for the Council to purchase a granite memorial to the unborn. Fr. Johnson had previously approved the memorial. The total cost to purchase and install the memorial and its concrete base is \$4,242.

The memorial (36" wide, 16" high, and 10" deep) would be placed at the northwest corner of the church, behind the statue of Mary. This memorial will be for all unborn children, either due to abortion or miscarriage, died in the womb, or during the birth process.

The photo at right shows a similar memorial erected by a Council in Arizona. The front of the St. Agnes Parish memorial will read "In Memory of the Unborn" across the top, with "St. Agnes Council 15344 Knights of Columbus" across the bottom. The emblem of the Order will be featured in the center of the memorial, rather than the round bronze plaque in the photo.

About one-half of the total cost to purchase and install the memorial is estimated to be recovered through the



sale of 4 x 8-inch Prayer Bricks at \$50 each. Using state-of-the-art laser technology, the bricks – like those in the photo in front of the memorial – can be custom engraved with up to three lines of text to honor children, grandchildren, parents, special friends, as well as memorialize loved ones. Sales of the Prayer Bricks will begin in the Spring.

Fabrication, shipping, and installation of the memorial will take several months.

#### **One Warm Coat Drive a Huge Success**

In California, 13.3% of the population lives below the poverty level, which for a family of four is about \$25,000. That's about one in every eight Californians living in poverty. That includes people working at minimum wage jobs — even holding down several jobs, seniors living on fixed incomes, and wage earners suddenly out of work. That means many families struggling to make ends meet, using their scarce resources to meet the most basic of needs, and not always able to afford the vital essential of a new winter coat.

Led by Brother Cheng-Feng Tsai, the Council's *One Warm Coat* Drive collected nearly 100 coats (56 women's, 33 men's, and 5 children's coats) and 28 miscellaneous items from St. Agnes School and Parish during November. Now dozens of our neighbors will be warmer this winter because others realized that a coat which they no longer needed was still useful and warm and needed by someone else.

The One Warm Coat Drive differs from the Knight's of Columbus' official 'Coats for Kids' program, because One Warm Coat collects donations of used coats of all sizes, which the council then distributes wherever the coats are needed. The Coats for Kids' program requires a Council to purchase a minimum of one dozen new children's coats (at \$13 -\$18 each) for distribution. That means our Council did not have to solicit donations or use \$1,250 in Council funds to supply nearly 100 coats.

Over the next few weeks, Brother Sumner Peery will distribute the sorted coats to local shelters.
